It's a story that grips the reader right at the beginning and never lets them put it down before they have reached the end. Aabhi, Self-immolation, Curfew and A Practical Joke are the other powerful stories. All of these enthrall and teach. They 'take us out of ourselves and stuffs us back in, outsized'. I congratulate all the writers whose stories have found their well-deserved space in our journal and thank them for sharing their works with us.
