Then Shahjahan married Mumtaz's sister.


Standing in front of the Taj Mahal,

Sarangi is an important link for Australia-India literary voices with five collaborative anthologies of poems. He guest edited four issues for the Muse India, latest being, "Aroma of the Heart: Poetry by the Youth". He currently serves as Chief Editor of international poetry journal Teesta. He is on the editorial boards of several journals of language and literature, and has served as a peer reviewer as well as interviewing several prominent Indian writers. He currently is an individual editor for the New Fiction Journal and Writers, Editors, Critics.

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
